In planning and performing our audit of the modified cash based financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of the Park Hill School District (the "District") as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we considered the District's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and, therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention to those charged with governance.

Our comments concerning internal control and other significant matters are presented as follows:

I. CHANGES IMPACTING GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS

GASB Statement No. 72– *Fair Value Measurement and Application*. The objective is to improve guidance for determining fair value measurement for financial reporting purposes. This Statement is effective for periods beginning after June 15, 2015.

GASB Statement No. 73– *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions and Related Assets that are not within the Scope of GASB Statement 68, and Amendments to Certain Provisions of GASB Statements 67 and 68*. The objective is to improve the usefulness of information about pensions included in the general purpose external financial reports of state and local governments for making decisions and assessing accountability. This Statement is effective for periods beginning after June 15, 2015.

GASB Statement No. 74– *Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefit Plans Other than Pension Plans*. The objective of this Statement is to improve the usefulness of information about postemployment benefits other than pensions (other postemployment benefits or OPEB) included in the general purpose external financial reports of state and local governments OPEB plans for making decisions and assessing accountability. This Statement is effective for periods beginning after June 15, 2016.

GASB Statement No. 75 – *Accounting and Financial Reporting for Postemployment Benefits Other Than Pensions*. The objective of this Statement is to improve accounting and financial reporting by state and local governments for postemployment benefits other than pensions (other postemployment benefits or OPEB). It also improves information provided by state and local governmental employers about financial support for OPEB that is provided by other entities. This Statement is effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2017.

GASB Statement No. 76– *The Hierarchy of Generally Accepted Accounting Principles for State and Local Governments*. The objective of this Statement is to identify – in the context of current governmental financial reporting environment – the hierarchy of generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). This Statement is effective for periods beginning after June 15, 2015.

GASB Statement No. 77– *Tax Abatement Disclosures*. The objective of this Statement is to require governments that enter into tax abatement agreements to further disclose various details regarding the specific taxes, commitments, and amounts of the taxes being abated. This Statement is effective for periods beginning after December 15, 2015.

II. INFORMATION REQUIRED BY PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS

Our Responsibilities under U.S. Generally Accepted Auditing Standards and *Government Auditing Standards*

Professional standards require that we provide you with information about our responsibilities under generally accepted auditing standards, *Government Auditing Standards* and *OMB Circular A-133*, as well as certain information related to the planned scope and timing of our audit. We have communicated such information in our letter to you dated July 15, 2015. Professional standards also require that we communicate to you the following information related to our audit.

II. INFORMATION REQUIRED BY PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS (Continued)

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used by the District are described in Note I to the financial statements. We noted no transactions entered into by Park Hill School District during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus. All significant transactions have been recognized in the financial statements in the proper period.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. Due to the District applying the modified cash basis of accounting, no estimates are made during the preparation of financial statements.

The financial statement disclosures are neutral, consistent, and clear.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known and likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are clearly trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Management has corrected all such misstatements. In addition, none of the misstatements detected as a result of audit procedures and corrected by management were material, either individually or in the aggregate, to each opinion unit's financial statements taken as a whole.

Disagreements with Management

For purposes of this letter, a disagreement with management is a financial accounting, reporting, or auditing matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated September 29, 2015.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the District's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

II. INFORMATION REQUIRED BY PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS (Concluded)

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the District's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Other Matters

We were engaged to report on budgetary comparison schedules and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, which accompany the financial statements but are not RSI (required supplementary information). With respect to this supplementary information, we made certain inquiries of management and evaluated the form, content, and methods of preparing the information to determine that the information complies with the modified cash basis of accounting, the method of preparing it has not changed from the prior period, and the information is appropriate and complete in relation to our audit of the financial statements. We compared and reconciled the supplementary information to the underlying accounting records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves.

We were not engaged to report on management's discussion and analysis, which accompanies the financial statements but is not RSI. We did not audit or perform other procedures on this other information and we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the Board of Education

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying modified cash basis financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund of Park Hill School District ("District"), Missouri, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting described in Note I; this includes determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective modified cash basis financial position of the governmental activities and each major fund of the District as of June 30, 2015, and the respective changes in modified cash basis financial position thereof for the year then ended in accordance with the basis of accounting described in Note I.

Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note I of the financial statements, that describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on a modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinions are not modified with respect to this matter.

Other Matters

Report on Supplementary and Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the District's basic financial statements. The budgetary comparison schedules and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The budgetary comparison schedules presented on pages 35 through 39 and schedule of expenditures of federal awards presented on page 50 are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the budgetary comparison schedules and schedule of expenditures of federal awards are fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

The management's discussion and analysis on pages 3 through 10 has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 29, 2015, on our consideration of the District's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

The Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) of the Park Hill School District ("District") provides an overview and analysis of the District's modified cash basis financial activities for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015. The intent of the MD&A is to look at the District's modified cash basis financial performance as a whole. Readers should also review the modified cash basis financial statements found in the Financial Section starting on page 11 and the notes thereto to enhance their understanding of the District's modified cash basis financial performance.

The financial statements of the District have been prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, as applied to local governmental units, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Differences in the modified cash basis of accounting and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America arise in the recognition of revenue when received, rather than when earned, and the presentation of expenditures/expenses when paid versus when incurred. Additional information of the District's modified cash basis of accounting can be found in Note I on Page 15.

The MD&A is an element of Required Supplementary Information specified in the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 34 – Basic Financial Statements – and Management's Discussion and Analysis – for State and Local Governments issued in 1999. Certain comparative information between the current year, 2013-2014 (FY2014), and the prior year, 2012-2013 (FY2013), is required to be presented in the MD&A.

Financial Highlights

Key financial highlights for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015, include the following:

The governmental activities net assets and governmental funds ending balances (modified cash basis) were \$56,380,096.67 as compared to \$62,443,261.25 the previous year. The decrease is primarily due to expenditures related to bond projects where revenues were received in a prior fiscal year.

The school district collected \$23,065,056.21 in program revenues, which made up 15.6% of the total revenues collected for the year ended June 30, 2015. This is compared to 15.8% the previous fiscal year. These program revenues covered 15.0% of the program expenditures paid leaving 85.0%, to be covered by general revenues collected and fund balances. This is compared to 15.1% of the program expenditures paid leaving 84.9%, to be covered by general revenues collected and fund balances the previous fiscal year.

Using the Basic Financial Statements

The District's basic financial statements consist of a series of financial statements and the associated notes to those statements. The statements are organized so the reader can understand the modified cash

basis operations of the District as a whole (i.e., an entire operating entity). The “Basic Financial Statements” section includes government-wide financial statements, fund financial statements and notes to financial statements.

The government-wide financial statements, consisting of the Statement of Net Assets (modified cash basis) and the Statement of Activities (modified cash basis) (see pages 11 and 12), provide highly consolidated modified cash basis financial information and render a government-wide perspective of the District’s modified cash basis financial condition. They present an aggregate view of the District’s modified cash basis finances. These statements seek to answer the question, “How did the District do financially during the 2014-2015 fiscal year?” In short, is the District better financially this year, or is it worse than the prior year? These statements include all cash and investments using the modified cash basis of accounting.

By showing the change in net assets (modified cash basis) for the year, the reader may ascertain whether the District’s modified cash basis financial condition has improved or deteriorated. The changes which are discussed in this MD&A may be financial or non-financial in nature. Non-financial factors which may have an impact on the District’s financial condition include increases in or erosion of the property tax base within the District, facilities maintenance and condition, mandated educational programs for which little or no funding is provided, or other external factors.

To provide more in depth reporting of the District’s modified cash basis financial position and changes in cash basis financial position, fund financial information is presented in the ‘Fund Financial Statements’ section beginning on page 13. These fund financial statements, which should be familiar to those who have read previous governmental financial statements, report governmental activities on a current cash basis, indicating modified cash basis sources and uses of funding.

Fund financial statements also provide more in-depth data on the District’s most significant funds, its General Fund, Special Revenue Fund, Debt Service Fund and Capital Fund. These funds are considered “major funds” under GASB Statement No. 34.

Government – Wide Financial Analysis

Net Assets of the District at June 30, 2015, of \$56,380,096.67 reflect the District’s total assets of cash and investments net of payroll liabilities at June 30, 2015. Net assets of the District consist of the following:

Governmental Activities (concluded)

As reflected on the previous page, the expenses paid of the District's governmental activities for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2015 and 2014 of \$154,172,420.50 and \$147,056,998.13 respectively are not all borne by the taxpayers of the District. Of these amounts \$9,435,044.98 and \$9,285,659.58 were paid by those who benefited from the services rendered (e.g., charges for school lunches) and \$13,630,011.23 and \$12,861,725.01 were paid through federal and state operating grants and contributions.

Consequently, the net costs of \$131,107,364.29 and \$124,909,613.54 after taking into consideration these fees and grants, were paid from other general revenues, which include property taxes paid by the taxpayers of the District as well as other taxes, additional state funding and fund balances.

The next table shows the total cost of programs and the net cost of these programs (after deducting charges for services and grants and contributions revenue collected of the various categories of expenses paid for the years ended June 30, 2015 and 2014. The net cost presentation allows the taxpayers of the District to determine the remaining cost of the various categories which were borne by them or paid from other general revenues and fund balances, and allows them the opportunity to assess the cost of these functions in comparison to the benefits received.

Governmental Funds Financial Analysis

The District uses funds to control and manage money for particular purposes (e.g., dedicated taxes and bond proceeds). The fund basis financial statements allow the District to demonstrate its stewardship over and accountability for modified cash basis resources provided by the taxpayers and other entities.

These statements also allow the reader to obtain more insight into the modified cash basis financial workings of the District and assess further the District's modified cash basis financial health. The District completed the fiscal year ended June 30, 2015 with a combined modified cash basis fund balance for Governmental funds (as presented in the Statement of Assets and Fund Balances (Modified cash basis) (on page 13) of \$56,380,096.67 as compared to a combined fund balance of \$62,443,261.25 on June 30, 2014, a decrease of \$6,063,164.58. The decrease is primarily due to the expenditures from bond projects where bond issuance revenues were received in a prior fiscal year.

The fund balance of the operating funds (General and Special Revenue) was increased by \$1,795,734.03 as compared to an increase of \$722,656.65 the previous year. In addition, a transfer of 4,740,096.00 was made from operating funds to the Capital Projects Fund during 2014-2015 (FY2015).

The fund balance of the Debt Service Fund increased by \$281,429.95 as a result of the collection of local tax revenue that was higher than the district's debt payment in 2014-2015 (FY2015). A year prior, the Debt Service Fund balance increased by 1,088,612.90. The \$10,149,909.52 balance of the Debt Service Fund is legally restricted for payment of bond principal, interest and related fees.

The fund balance of the Capital Fund decreased by \$8,140,328.56 as compared to a decrease of \$9,128,682.41 the previous year. The consecutive decreases in Capital Fund balance in the last two fiscal years are primarily due to the expenditures related to completion of projects described in the district's April, 2011 bond issue. \$49,500,000 of bonds were authorized by district voters in April, 2011, and sold in 2010-2011 and 2011-2012. No new bonds were sold in 2012-2013 or 2013-2014 but expenditures did occur against these revenues received in prior fiscal years. Additional expenditures occurred in 2014-2015 due to the implementation of 1:1 student laptops at the middle school level.

The district received \$105,102,267.73 in revenue from local sources. The major source of revenue for operations and debt service is local property taxes amounting to \$83,272,212.29. This is derived from the District's 2014-2015 operating levy of \$4.9543 and the debt service levy of \$.6107 for a total levy of \$5.5650. Other significant local revenues are \$9,399,598.25 from sales tax, \$494,569.96 from interest and earnings on investments, \$3,323,763.06 from food service, \$3,955,478.44 from community services and \$2,155,803.48 from student activities.

County revenues of \$3,984,257.07 are derived from state assessed utility property, \$3,249,840.28 and county fines of \$734,416.79.

State funding which makes up 22.5% of total revenues collected increased from the previous year by \$5,181,719.57 to \$33,281,033.90. The State Foundation Formula for Basic State Aid (including Classroom Trust Fund) was \$29,217,686.00, an increase of \$4,895,408.00 from the prior year. State revenues collected are:

Total expenditures paid were \$154,172,420.50 for the year compared to \$147,056,998.13 the previous fiscal year. The increase in spending is primarily due to expenses related to bond and capital projects, including the implementation of student 1:1 computer program at the middle school.

The General Fund accounts for \$53,107,667.16 or 34.4% of the total expenditures. The Special Revenue (Teachers) Fund accounts for \$72,184,287.77 or 46.8% of total expenditures and consists of certificated teachers' and administrators' salaries and insurance benefits. Debt Service Fund expenditures of \$9,356,712.50 or 6.1% of total expenditures are for principal and interest on general obligation bonds. Capital Fund expenditures of \$19,523,753.07 or 12.7% of total expenditures are for construction projects, facility repairs and equipment.

Budgetary Highlights

Over the course of the year, the Board of Education revised the District's budget to take into consideration expected changes in revenues collected or expenditures paid. Missouri statutes for public School finance, Section 67.010, RSMo., require a budget amendment if anticipated expenditures are in excess of budgetary goals. The original budget was adopted on June 26, 2014, and the final budget amendment was adopted on June 25, 2015.

Statements comparing fund modified cash basis revenues and expenditures to the original and final budgets are provided in the auditor's report on pages 35-39. General revenues exceeded the original budgets reflecting increases over budgeted values in local and county sources. Expenditures were less than the original budgets primarily due to expenditures being reduced as a result of the uncertainties in state funding and the warnings of further reductions projected for the next few years.

Capital Assets and Debt Administration

Capital Assets

The District operates under the modified cash basis of accounting, therefore, capital asset purchases are recorded as expenditures and depreciation is not recognized. Capital assets are not reflected in the financial statements.

Long-Term Debt

At June 30, 2015, the District had outstanding general obligation bonds of \$85,570,000.00 reflecting the issuance of no new bonds or refinance of a prior bond issues and principal payments of \$5,945,000.00 made during the year.

State statutes limit the amount of general obligation debt a school district may issue to 15% of the assessed valuation. The debt limitation is \$224,790,046.50 at June 30, 2015, based on the December 31, 2014 assessed values.

On November 20, 2003, the Board approved a DNR Energy Loan of approximately \$4,118,251 for which the construction maximum amount was \$4,077,711. These funds were used to upgrade current energy issues within existing facilities. The District will pay principle and interest on this loan through 2020. The District has an outstanding loan payment of \$1,437,229.95 at June 30, 2015.

The District operates on the modified cash basis of accounting, therefore, payments on long-term debt are recorded as expenditures. Long-term debt is not reflected in the financial statements. Commitments for long-term debt and other obligations are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements in Notes IV-VI.

I. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Park Hill School District ("District") operates under the regulations pursuant to Section RSMo Chapter 162.092 of the Public School Laws of Missouri, which designates a Board of Education to act as the governing authority. The District provides educational services.

The financial statements of Park Hill School District have been prepared on the prescribed basis of accounting that demonstrates compliance with the modified cash basis and budget laws of the State of Missouri, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the District's accounting policies are described below.

A. Principles Used to Determine Scope of Entity

The District's reporting entity includes the District's governing board and all related organizations that exercise oversight responsibility.

The District has developed criteria to determine whether outside agencies with activities that benefit the citizens of the District, including joint agreements that serve pupils from numerous districts, should be included within its financial reporting entity. The criterion includes, but is not limited to, whether the District exercises oversight responsibility (which includes financial interdependency, selection of governing authority, designation of management, ability to significantly influence operations, and accountability for fiscal matter), scope of public service, and special financing relationships.

Excluded from the reporting entity:

Public School Retirement System of Missouri, Public Education Employee Retirement System, and Missouri United School Insurance Council (MUSIC). The participating School District's governing bodies have appointed these potential component units jointly. These are independent units that select management staff, set user charges, establish budgets and control all aspects of its daily activity.

The District has determined that no other outside agency meets the above criteria and, therefore, no other agency has been included as a component unit in the District's financial statements. In addition, the District is not aware of any entity that would exercise such oversight, which would result in the District being considered a component unit of the entity.

B. Basis of Presentation – Fund Accounting

The District's accounts are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. Each fund's operations are accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts, which comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balance, revenues, and expenditures. District resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The following fund types are used by the District on the modified cash basis of accounting.

B. Basis of Presentation – Fund Accounting (concluded)

The School District reports the following major funds and fund types in this report:

Governmental Funds:

General (Incidental) Fund: Accounts for general activities of the District, including student activities, food service, and community education, which are not required to be accounted for in another fund.

Special Revenue (Teachers') Fund: Accounts for expenditures for certified employees involved in administration and instruction. It includes revenues restricted by the State and local tax levy for the payment of teacher salaries and certain employee benefits.

Capital Projects Fund: Accounts for the proceeds of long-term debt, taxes and other revenues restricted for acquisition or construction of major capital assets.

Debt Service Fund: Accounts for the accumulation of resources for, and the payment of, principal, interest and finance charges on general long-term debt.

The District's basic financial statements consist of government-wide statements, including a statement of net position and a statement of activities, and fund financial statements, which provide a more detailed level of financial information.

Government-Wide Financial Statements:

Statement of Net Position: Presents the financial condition of the government at year-end.

Statement of Activities: Presents a comparison between direct expenses and program revenues for each program or function of the District's governmental activities. Direct expenses are those that are specifically associated with a service, program or department, and therefore are clearly identifiable to a particular function. Program revenues include charges paid by the recipient of the goods or services offered by the program, grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular program and interest earned on grants that is required to support a particular program. Revenues, which are not classified as program revenues, are presented as the District's general revenues with certain limited exceptions. The comparison of direct expenses with program revenues identifies the extent to which each governmental function is self-financing or drawing from the District's general revenues.

Fund Financial Statements: During the year, the District segregates transactions related to certain District functions or activities in separate funds in order to aid financial management and to demonstrate legal compliance. Fund financial statements are designed to present the District's financial information at this more detailed level. The focus of governmental financial statements is on major funds. Each major fund is presented in a separate column. Non-major funds, if applicable, are aggregated and presented in a single column.

C. Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are presented on a modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as established by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board. This basis of accounting involves modifications to the cash basis of accounting to report in the statement of net position or balance sheet cash transactions or events that provide a benefit or result in an obligation that covers a period greater than the period in which the cash transaction or event occurred. Such reported balances include investments arising from cash transactions or events.

This modified cash basis of accounting differs from GAAP primarily because certain assets and their related revenues (such as accounts receivable and revenue for billed or provided services not yet collected, and other accrued revenue and receivables) and certain liabilities and their related expenses or expenditures (such as accounts payable and expenses for goods or services received but not yet paid, and other accrued expenses and liabilities) are not recorded in these financial statements. In addition, other economic assets, deferred outflows, liabilities, and deferred inflows that do not arise from a cash transaction or event (such as donated assets and post-employment benefit obligations) are not reported, and the measurement of reported assets and liabilities does not involve adjustment to fair value.

If the District utilized the basis of accounting recognized as generally accepted in the United States, the fund financial statements for governmental funds would use the modified accrual basis of accounting, and the fund financial statements for proprietary fund types (if any) would use the accrual basis of accounting. All government-wide financial statements would be presented on the accrual basis of accounting.

D. Pooled Cash and Temporary Investments

Cash resources of the individual funds are combined to form a pool of cash and temporary investments that is managed by the District Treasurer. Investments of the pooled accounts consist of certificates of deposit, U.S. Agency Securities and MOSIP investments, carried at cost, which approximates market. Interest income earned is allocated to contributing funds based on cash and temporary investment balances.

E. Property and Equipment

Capital fixed assets are recorded as expenditures in the General (Incidental) Fund and the Capital Projects (Building) Fund at the time the expenditures are paid. No depreciation is provided for property and equipment.

F. Compensated Absences

Vacation time, personal business days, and sick leave are considered as expenditures in the year paid. Amounts that are unpaid and vested in the employee are payable upon termination. Total vested and unpaid vacation and sick leave at June 30, 2015, amounted to approximately \$3,986,101. These estimates have not been subjected to auditing procedures.

G. Teachers' Salaries

The District's salary payment schedule for the 2014-2015 school year requires paying salaries over a 12-month period. Consequently, the July and August 2015 payroll checks are included in the financial statements as an expenditure paid in the month of May. This practice has been consistently followed in previous years.

H. Fund Balance Classification

The governmental fund financial statements present fund balances based on classifications that comprise a hierarchy based primarily on the extent to which the District is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts in the respective governmental funds can be spent. The classifications used in the governmental fund financial statements are as follows:

- Nonspendable Fund Balance consists of funds that cannot be spent due to their form (e.g., inventories and prepaids) or funds that legally or contractually must remain intact. The District did not have nonspendable resources as of June 30, 2015.
- Restricted Fund Balance consists of funds that are mandated for a specific purpose by external parties, constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. Debt service resources are to be used for future servicing of the District-held bonds and are restricted through debt covenants.
- Committed Fund Balance consists of funds that are set aside for a specific purpose by the District's highest level of decision-making authority which is the Board of Education. Formal action must be taken prior to the end of the fiscal year, such as a vote from the Board of Education. The same formal action must be taken to remove or change the limitations placed on the funds.
- Assigned Fund Balance consists of funds that are set aside for a specific purpose by the District's highest level of decision-making authority, which is the Board of Education, or a body or official, such as the Superintendent, that has been given the authority to assign funds. Assigned funds cannot cause a deficit in unassigned fund balance. This classification includes the remaining positive fund balance of all governmental funds except for the General Fund.
- Unassigned Fund Balance consists of excess funds that have not been classified in the previous four categories. All funds in this category are considered spendable resources. This category also provides the resources necessary to meet unexpected expenditures and revenue shortfalls.

The District would typically use Restricted Fund balances first, followed by Committed resources, and then Assigned resources, as appropriate opportunities arise, but reserves the right to selectively spend Unassigned resources first to defer using these other classified funds.

I. Interfund Activity

Interfund transfers are reported as other financing sources/uses in governmental funds. Repayments from funds responsible for particular expenditures/expenses to the funds that initially paid for them are not presented on the financial statements.

J. Extraordinary and Special Items

Extraordinary items are transactions or events that are both unusual in nature and infrequent in occurrence. Special items are transactions or events that are within the control of the Board of Education and that are either unusual in nature or infrequent in occurrence.

K. Inventories

The District does not maintain inventory cost records. Inventory is deemed to be immaterial and accounted for using the purchase method in which supplies are charged to expenditures when purchased.

II. CASH AND INVESTMENTS

The District maintains a cash and temporary investment pool that is available for use by all funds except the Debt Service Fund (State law requires that all deposits of the Debt Service Fund be kept separate and apart from all other funds of the District). Deposits with maturities greater than three months are considered investments. Each fund type's portion of this pool is displayed on the balance sheet as "Cash and Cash Equivalents and Investments" under each fund's caption.

Deposits

Missouri statutes require that all deposits with financial institutions be collateralized in an amount at least equal to uninsured deposits. At June 30, 2015, the carrying amount of the District's pooled deposits and investments was \$56,380,096.67, and the bank balance was \$68,745,490.01. As of June 30, 2015, 100% of the District's investments were guaranteed by the U.S. Government through pledged securities and FDIC insurance.

Custodial Credit Risk – Deposits

For a deposit, custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the government's deposits may not be returned to it. The District's investment policy does not include custodial credit risk requirements. The District's deposits were not exposed to custodial credit risk at year end.

Custodial Credit Risk – Investments

Investment securities are exposed to custodial credit risk if the securities are uninsured, are not registered in the name of the District, and are held by the party who sold the security to the District or its agent but not in the government's name.

The District does not have a policy for custodial credit risk relating to investments. All investments, evidenced by individual securities, are registered in the name of the District or of a type not exposed to custodial credit risk.

Investment Interest Rate Risk

Investment interest rate risk is the risk that changes in interest rates will adversely affect the fair value of an investment. The District does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates, however they do follow the Missouri State Treasurer Investment Policy.

Concentration of Investment Credit Risk

Concentration of investment credit risk is required to be disclosed by the District for any single investment that represents 5% or more of total investments (excluding investments issued by or explicitly guaranteed by the U.S. Government, investments in mutual funds, investments in external investment pools and investments in other pooled investments). The District has no policy in place to minimize the risk of loss resulting from over concentration of assets in specific maturity, specific issuer or specific class of securities. The District's deposits were not exposed to concentration of investment credit risk for the year ended June 30, 2015.

III. TAXES

Property taxes attach as an enforceable lien on property as of January 1. Taxes are levied on November 1 and are payable by December 31. The county collects the property tax and remits it to the District.

The District also receives sales tax collected by the State, and it is remitted based on a prior year weighted average attendance. The assessed valuation of the tangible taxable property for the calendar year 2014, for purposes of local taxation, was:

Net Pension Liability

For fiscal year 2015, Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statement No. 68, "Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions" and GASB Statement No. 71, "Pension Transition for Contributions Made Subsequent to the Measurement Date—an amendment of GASB Statement No. 68" were effective. These GASB pronouncements had no effect on beginning net position as reported June 30, 2014, as the net pension liability is not reported in the accompanying financial statements. The net pension liability has been disclosed below.

Pensions are a component of exchange transactions—between an employer and its employees—of salaries and benefits for employee services. Pensions are provided to an employee—on a deferred-payment basis—as part of the total compensation package offered by an employer for employee services each financial period.

The net pension liability represents the School District's proportionate share of each pension plan's collective actuarial present value of projected benefit payments attributable to past periods of service, net of each pension plan's fiduciary net position. The net pension liability calculation is dependent on critical long-term variables, including estimated average life expectancies, earnings on investments, cost of living adjustments and others. While these estimates use the best information available, unknowable future events require adjusting this estimate annually.

General Information about the Pension Plan - PSRS

Plan Description. PSRS is a mandatory cost-sharing multiple employer retirement system for all full-time certificated employees and certain part-time certificated employees of all public school districts in Missouri (except the school districts of St. Louis and Kansas City) and all public community colleges. PSRS also includes certificated employees of PSRS, Missouri State Teachers' Association, Missouri State High School Activities Association, and certain employees of the state of Missouri who elected to remain covered by PSRS under legislation enacted in 1986, 1987 and 1989. The majority of PSRS members are exempt from Social Security contributions. In some instances, positions may be determined not to be exempt from Social Security contributions. Any PSRS member who is required to contribute to Social Security comes under the requirements of Section 169.070 (9) RSMo, known as the "2/3's statute." PSRS members required to contribute to Social Security are required to contribute two-thirds of the approved PSRS contribution rate and their employer is required to match the contribution. The members' benefits are further calculated at two-thirds the normal benefit amount. A Comprehensive Annual Financial Report ("CAFR") can be obtained at www.psrps-peers.org.

Benefits Provided. PSRS is a defined benefit plan providing retirement, disability, and death/survivor benefits. Members are vested for service retirement benefits after accruing five years of service. Individuals who (a) are at least age 60 and have a minimum of 5 years of service, (b) have 30 years of service, or (c) qualify for benefits under the "Rule of 80" (service and age total at least 80) are entitled to a monthly benefit for life, which is calculated using a 2.5% benefit factor. Beginning July 1, 2001, and ending July 1, 2014, a 2.55% benefit factor is used to calculate benefits for members who have 31 or more years of service. Actuarially age-reduced benefits are available for members with five to 24.9 years of service at age 55. Members who are younger than age 55 and who do not qualify under the "Rule of 80" but have between 25 and 29.9 years of service may retire with a lesser benefit factor. Members that are three years beyond normal retirement can elect to have their lifetime monthly benefits actuarially reduced in exchange for the right to also receive a one-time partial lump sum (PLSO)

payment at retirement equal to 12, 24, or 36 times the Single Life benefit amount. A Summary Plan Description detailing the provisions of the plan can be found on PSRS' website at www.psr-peers.org. Since the prior valuation date, the benefit provisions were amended to make permanent an early retirement benefit allowing members to retire at any age after 25 years of service.

Cost-of-Living Adjustments ("COLA"). The PSRS Board has established a policy of providing a 2.00% COLA for years in which the CPI increases between 0.00% and 5.00%. If the CPI increase is greater than 5.00%, the Board will provide a COLA of 5.00%. If the CPI decreases, no COLA is provided. For any member retiring on or after July 1, 2001, such adjustments commence on the second January after commencement of benefits and occur annually thereafter. The total of such increases may not exceed 80% of the original benefit for any member.

Contributions. PSRS members were required to contribute 14.5% of their annual covered salary during fiscal year 2015. Employers were required to match the contributions made by employees. The contribution rate is set each year by the PSRS Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the independent actuary within the contribution restrictions set in Section 169.030 RSMo. The annual statutory increase in the total contribution rate may not exceed 1% of pay. Contributions for employees of the State of Missouri were made by the state in accordance with the actuarially determined contribution rate needed to fund current costs and prior service costs of state employees as authorized in Section 104.342.8 RSMo.

The district's contributions to PSRS were \$8,601,335.70 for the year ended June 30, 2015.

General Information about the Pension Plan - PEERS

Plan Description. PEERS is a mandatory cost-sharing multiple employer retirement system for all public school district employees (except the school districts of St. Louis and Kansas City), employees of the Missouri Association of School Administrators, and community college employees (except the Community College of St. Louis). Employees of covered districts who work 20 or more hours per week on a regular basis and who are not contributing members of the Public School Retirement System of Missouri (PSRS) must contribute to PEERS. Employees of PSRS who do not hold Missouri educator certificates also contribute to PEERS. PEERS was established as a trust fund by an Act of the Missouri General Assembly effective October 13, 1965. Statutes governing the System are found in Sections 169.600 - 169.715 and Sections 169.560-169.595 RSMo. The statutes place responsibility for the operation of PEERS on the Board of Trustees of the Public School Retirement System of Missouri. A Comprehensive Annual Financial Report ("CAFR") can be obtained at www.psr-peers.org.

Benefits Provided. PEERS is a defined benefit plan providing service retirement and disability benefits to its members. Members are vested for service retirement benefits after accruing five years of service. Individuals who (a) are at least age 60 and have a minimum of five years of service, (b) have 30 years of service, or (c) qualify for benefits under the "Rule of 80" (service and age total at least 80) are entitled to a monthly benefit for life, which is calculated using a 1.61% benefit factor. Members qualifying for "Rule of 80" or "30-and-out" are entitled to an additional temporary .8% benefit multiplier until reaching minimum Social Security age (currently

age 62). Actuarially age-reduced retirement benefits are available with five years of service at age 55. Members who are younger than age 55 and who do not qualify under the “Rule of 80” but have between 25 and 29.9 years of service may retire with a lesser benefit factor. Members that are three years beyond normal retirement can elect to have their lifetime monthly benefits actuarially reduced in exchange for the right to also receive a one-time partial lump sum (PLSO) payment at retirement equal to 12, 24, or 36 times the Single Life benefit amount. A Summary Plan Description detailing the provisions of the plan can be found on PSRS' website at www.psr-peers.org.

Cost-of-Living Adjustments (COLA). The PEERS Board has established a policy of providing a 2.00% COLA for years in which the CPI increases between 0.00% and 5.00%. If the CPI increase is greater than 5.00%, the Board will provide a COLA of 5.00%. If the CPI decreases, no COLA is provided. For any member, such adjustments commence on the fourth January after commencement of benefits and occur annually thereafter. The total of such increases may not exceed 80% of the original benefit for any member.

Contributions . PEERS members were required to contribute 6.86% of their annual covered salary during fiscal year 2015. Employers were required to match the contributions made by employees. The contribution rate is set each year by the PSRS Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the independent actuary within the contribution restrictions set in Section 169.030 RSMo. The annual statutory increase in the total contribution rate may not exceed 0.5% of pay.

The district's contributions to PEERS were \$1,516,777.11 for the year ended June 30, 2015.

Pension Liabilities and Pension Expense - PSRS

At June 30, 2015, the district has a liability of \$54,018,610 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability for the plan in total was measured as of June 30, 2014 and determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. The district's proportionate share of the total net pension liability was based on the ratio of its actual contributions of \$8,478,966 paid to PSRS for the year ended June 30, 2014 relative to the actual contributions of \$643,964,894 from all participating employers. At June 30, 2014, the district's proportionate share was 1.3167%.

Pension Liabilities and Pension Expense - PEERS

At June 30, 2015, the district has a liability of \$5,462,517 for its proportionate share of the net pension liability. The net pension liability for the plan in total was measured as of June 30, 2014 and determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. The district's proportionate share of the total net pension liability was based on the ratio of its actual contributions of \$1,496,434 paid to PEERS for the year ended June 30, 2014 relative to the actual contributions of \$100,035,580 from all participating employers. At June 30, 2014, the district's proportionate share was 1.4959%.

Actuarial Assumptions - PSRS

Actuarial valuations of PSRS involves estimates of the reported amount and assumptions about probability of occurrence of events far into the future. Examples include assumptions about future employment, mortality and future salary increases. Amounts determined regarding the net pension liability are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared with past expectations and new estimates are made about the future. The last experience study was conducted in 2011 and the next experience study is scheduled for 2016.

Expected Rate of Return

The long-term expected rate of return on PSRS and PEERS' investments was determined using a building-block method in which best-estimate ranges of expected future real rates of returns (expected returns, net of investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rates of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation. Best estimates of arithmetic real rates of return for each major asset class included in PSRS and PEERS' target allocation as of June 30, 2014 is summarized below along with the long-term geometric return. Geometric return (also referred to as the time weighted return) is considered standard practice within the investment management industry. Geometric returns represent the compounded rate of growth of a portfolio. The method eliminates the effects created by cash flows.

- Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 8.00% as of June, 30, 2014, and is consistent with the long-term expected geometric return on plan investments. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employer contributions would be made at the actuarially calculated rate computed in accordance with assumptions and methods stated in the funding policy adopted by the Board of Trustees, which requires payment of the normal cost and amortization of the unfunded actuarially accrued liability in level percent of employee payroll installments over 30 years utilizing a closed period, layered approach. Based on this assumption, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current plan members.

VII. PARTICIPATION IN A PUBLIC ENTITY RISK POOL (MUSIC)

Participation in Public Entity Risk Pools – The District is exposed to various risks of loss due to torts; theft to, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The District has joined together with approximately 475 other Missouri public school districts and Missouri Junior Colleges to form the Missouri United School Insurance Council (MUSIC). MUSIC is a public entity risk pool currently operating as a common risk management and insurance program.

The District does not pay premiums to purchase insurance policies, but it pays an assessment to be a member of the self-sustaining risk sharing group. Part of the assessment is used to purchase excess insurance for the group as a whole. The calendar year 2015 assessment was \$1,307,550.

For the four previous years, the settlements did not exceed the insurance coverage provided by commercial insurance. There has been no significant reduction in insurance coverage from the preceding year.

The pooling agreement requires the pool to be self-sustaining. The District believes that it is not possible to estimate the range of contingent losses to be borne by the District.

VIII. CONTINGENCIES

The District receives federal grants and state funding for specific purposes that are subject to review and audit. These reviews and audits could lead to requests for reimbursement or to withholding future funding for disallowed expenditures or other noncompliance with terms of grants and State funding. The District is not aware of any noncompliance with Federal or State provisions that might require the District to provide reimbursement.

The District is involved in a pending lawsuit at June 30, 2015. No provision has been made in the financial statements for any loss that might arise in the event of an unfavorable outcome of these matters. District management believes that such litigation and claims will ultimately be resolved without material financial liability, if any, to the District.

IX. POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

In addition to the pension benefits described in Note VI, page 17, the District allows employees who retire from the District to participate in the District's health, dental and vision insurance plans. Upon meeting the retirement requirements per PSRS or PEERS, the employees can elect to participate in the District's plans. The retirees must pay for 100% of their coverage for each plan in which they elect to participate. The premiums are based on a single-blended rate used for both active employees and retirees. The difference between the amount the retiree is required to pay and the actual cost to the District is considered to be a post-employment benefit. The District has not established an irrevocable trust fund to accumulate resources for future payment of benefits under the plan; benefits are paid on a pay-as-you-go basis. A stand alone financial report is not available for the plan. During the year, 360 retirees participated in the District's insurance plans and paid premiums totaling \$1,152,281.81. There were 11 people who participated in COBRA for the year ended June 30, 2015, and paid premiums totaling \$30,360.77.

X. INTERFUND TRANSFERS

During 2015, transfers were made to the Capital Projects Fund and Special Revenue Fund from the General Fund. The transfer to the Capital Projects Fund consists of \$360,904.00 for DNR Energy Conservation loans and \$4,379,192.00 for a 7% \times SAT \times WADA transfer. The maximum allowable transfer is the greater of the prior year guaranteed tax base or 9% of the prior June 30 line one entitlement. A transfer of \$36,265,076.33 was made to the Special Revenue Fund in order to achieve a zero balance in the account.

XI. SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

On September 10, 2015, the District issued \$20,110,000 in Series 2015 General Obligation Refunding Bonds. These bonds were used to refund the Series 2006 Bonds. The Bond is due in varying annual installments beginning March 1, 2016, and continuing through September 1, 2025, and ranging from \$9,245,000 to \$395,000 with a variable interest rate ranging from 2.0% to 3.0%.

XIII. SUMMER EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

On March 6, 2014, the District entered onto a lease with Newton Alliance, LLC to provide a complete learning summer educational program for use in the District-sponsored summer extended learning program. For every 168 hours of actual student attendance in the program year, Newton shall be paid the sum of \$515 and for any fraction of the 168 hours of student attendance, a pro-rated portion of the \$151. The first payment was due in December 2014 with four additional payments that followed.

Budgets and Budgetary Accounting

The District follows these procedures in establishing the budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- 1) In accordance with Chapter 67, RSMo, the District adopts a budget for each fund of the political subdivision.
- 2) Prior to July, the Superintendent, who serves as the budget officer, submits to the Board of Education a proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning July 1. The proposed budget includes estimated revenues and proposed expenditures for all District funds. Budgeted expenditures cannot exceed beginning available monies plus estimated revenues for the year.
- 3) A public hearing is conducted to obtain taxpayer comments. Prior to its approval by the Board of Education, the budget document is available for public inspection.
- 4) On June 26, 2014, the budget was legally enacted by vote of the Board of Education.
- 5) Subsequent to its formal approval of the budget, the Board of Education has the authority to make necessary adjustments to the budget by formal vote of the Board. Adjustments made during the year are reflected in the budget information included in the financial statements.
- 6) Budgets for District funds are prepared and adopted on the cash basis (budget basis), recognizing revenues when collected and expenditures when paid.

POST-EMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

In addition to the pension benefits described in Note VI, page 17, the District allows employees who retire from the District to participate in the District's health, dental and vision insurance plans. Upon meeting the retirement requirements per PSRS or PEERS, the employees can elect to participate in the District's plans. The retirees must pay for 100% of their coverage for each plan in which they elect to participate. The premiums are based on a single-blended rate used for both active employees and retirees. The difference between the amount the retiree is required to pay and the actual cost to the District is considered to be a post-employment benefit. The District has not established an irrevocable trust fund to accumulate resources for future payment of benefits under the plan; benefits are paid on a pay-as-you-go basis. A stand alone financial report is not available for the plan. During the year, 360 retirees participated in the District's insurance plans and paid premiums totaling \$1,152,281.81. There were 11 people who participated in COBRA for the year ended June 30, 2015, and paid premiums totaling \$30,360.77.

Information on the federal program: The Grantee failed to be in compliance with OMB Circular A-87, Attachment B, Item 8h which states where employees are expected to work solely on a single Federal award or cost objective, charges for their salaries and wages will be supported by periodic certifications that employees worked solely on that program for the period covered by the certification. These certifications will be prepared at least semi-annually and will be signed by the employee or supervisory official having first-hand knowledge of the work performed by the employee.

Criteria: OMB Circular A-87 requires the auditee to prepare semi-annual certifications for employees who's salaries are being paid with federal funds.

Condition: Through auditing procedures, we noted that semi-annual certifications for employees' salaries being paid out of federal funds for the Special Education Cluster were not being performed.

Questioned Costs: Not applicable

Context: During the audit of federal programs, we discovered that semi-annual certifications for employees' salaries being paid out of federal funds were not being performed.

Effect: No semi-annual certifications for employees' salaries being paid out of federal funds for the Special Education Cluster were being performed, as required by OMB Circular A-87.

Cause: Adequate emphasis was not placed on the preparation of the semi-annual certifications for employees' salaries being paid out of federal funds for the Special Education Cluster.

Recommendation: The District should maintain and be in compliance with time and effort procedures, specifically those that deal with the semi-annual certification of employees that work in the special education program that are getting paid with IDEA part B federal funds.

Status: This finding was corrected for the year ended June 30, 2015.
